

Propositions Against Education

As a local city council member I am appalled at the governor's attempt to destroy public education. His propositions – 74, 75 and 76 – are aimed to attack teachers, public education and our students.

Proposition 74 unfairly blames teachers, and not under-funding, as the problem in our public schools. It lengthens a teacher's probationary period from two to five years (no other profession has even a two-year probation period). It eliminates key due process rights of permanent teachers. Worst of all, it does nothing to improve student learning, or to attract and retain quality teachers.

Proposition 75 is an attempt to silence the voices of those who oppose cuts to healthcare, education and public safety. It singles out public employee unions, not corporate special interests that outspend unions 24 to 1. This is not a level playing field.

Proposition 76 cuts education funding by \$4 billion. This is an amendment to our state constitution to give the governor

unchecked power to cut the state budget. It shortchanges California's students and educators by eliminating the minimum education funding guarantee in voter-approved Prop 98. This is too much power for one person to have.

These propositions will hurt our students. We need to improve education, not attack teachers and cut education funding. I urge all the voters of this great state to stop the governor's power grab and Vote no on Propositions 74, 75 and 76.
